Defining Feedback

1 Constructive Guidance

2 Timely and Relevant

The Role of Feedback in Assessment

Guiding Learning

Formative vs. Summative Feedback

Formative Feedback

Provided during the learning process to help students improve and refine their work.

2

Summative Feedback

Provided at the end of a learning unit to evaluate a student's overall performance.

3

Collaborative Approach

Combining both formative and summative feedback creates a comprehensive assessment strategy.

Characteristics of Effective Feedback

Specific

Feedback should be tailored to the individual student's work and provide clear, actionable guidance.

Constructive

Feedback should focus on strengths and areas for improvement, not just criticize.

Timely

Feedback should be provided promptly, while the work is still fresh in the student's mind.

Encouraging

Feedback should inspire and motivate students to continue learning and improving.

Feedback Delivery Strategies



Written

Provides detailed, written comments on student work.



Video

Offers a more personal and engaging way to deliver feedback.



Verbal

Allows for immediate, back-and-forth dialogue between teacher and student.



Peer

Encourages students to provide feedback to one another.

Incorporating Peer Feedback

Establish Guidelines

Set clear expectations for the peer feedback process.

Model Good Practices

Demonstrate how to provide constructive, actionable feedback.

Foster Collaboration

Encourage students to work together and learn from each other.



Feedback and Self-Assessment

Self-Reflection
